

2 Tbs butter

1 small yellow onion, chopped

2 zucchini, cubed (slightly smaller than potato cubes)

2 Potatoes, peeled and cubed

Coarse black pepper

1 teaspoon dry Italian seasoning (or a combination of oregano and thyme) Chopped parsley (optional)

Directions

1. Heat a 12 inch straight skillet. Add oil, onion and butter. Add potatoes and cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add Zucchini, salt, pepper, and Italian seasoning and sauté 8 to 10 minutes more, until zucchini are just tender.
