- Special Olympics, the international sporting organization for people with intellectual disabilities, conceived by the Kennedy Foundation, got its start through a Special Recreation Program at 10 Chicago parks, which led to a competition at Soldier Field on July 20, 1968.
- Daniel Radcliffe, star of Harry Potter, suffers from dyspraxia, a neurological problem that impairs the organization of movement.
- Harry Potter fans who read Braille didn't have to worry about spoilers from their sighted friends in 2005, when Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince became the first to be simultaneously released in Braille and print.
- Jim Abbott is another great example of someone who didn't let their disability get in the way of their athletic profession and love for their sport. Being born without a right hand would most likely be a large hindrance on playing any sport, but that didn't stop Jim. He went on to play in the college baseball scene, all the way up into the New York Yankees. He became one of the best left handed pitchers in the entire league, and scored a grand total of 888 strikeouts against opposing batters.
